OVER 100 HEAD OF LIVESTOCK ARE BEING SHIPPED IN

Over a hundred wild horses, wild Bramas, and Texas Long Horns will be loaded out of Blackfoot, Idaho, for Nephi to be used during the greatest rodeo ever staged in the State of Utah.

Among the selections are a number of wild horses that have been able to buck off several of the world's best riders while others have not been used in the rodeo arena, according to J. C. Sorenson, who has charge of the large ranch at Forti where the livestock are being fed.

69 Floats To Enter Parade

The parade committee are pleased to report that as pay for their efforts they expect to have one of the largest and most colorful parades that Nephi has ever seen.

There will be nine sections and each will be headed with a band. The Blackhawk Queen, Miss Nephi and the Goddess of Liberty will ride on beautiful floats which are being furnished through the courtesy of the Utah-Idaho Sugar Company, Utah Oil and Refining Company and The Paramount Baking Company, respectively.

The committee is more than pleased with the spirit of cooperation and response received from firms, bands and cities throughout the state who have been invited to participate in the parade.

The parade will form with all its sections in the northern extremity of the city starting at 7th North on Main street. Special committees will be in charge of each section. The procession will proceed through the business section to 6th South where it will turn east to 1st East. Thence north along 1st East street, to Second South street where it will return to Main and proceed north to the city park.

Funeral services will be held at the North Ward Chapel, Sunday afternoon at 2 p. m. for Peter P. Anderson, who died at his home in this city Thursday.

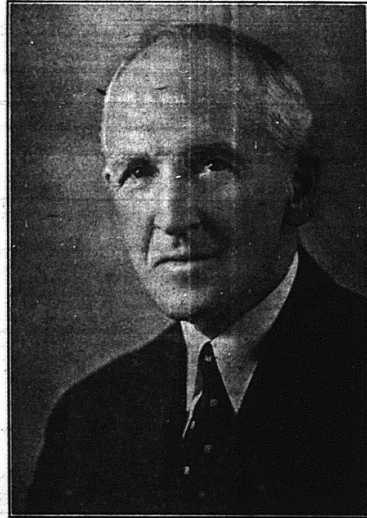

NEW BLEACHERS ARE BEING BUILT AT FAIR GROUNDS

June Kendall, chairman of the Rodeo and Racing Committee, stated Thursday that extensive preparations are being made to handle 5000 people at the rodeo grounds which is now under construction at the Juab County Fair Grounds in this city.

The grand stand is being enlarged to accommodate 1000 people, and bleachers being built which will take care of 1750, and general admission room for about 2250, which will include parking and standing room.

In addition to the construction of seats to accommodate the vast crowds that will be attracted at the Blackhawk encampment, the constructing of the large arena is now under way, which consists of nine shutes, large arenas and a 160 by 320 arena. The bleachers are using 1000 large aspen poles and 100 large cedar posts in the building of the arena and shutes, in addition to the necessary labor. This arena will be one of the best constructed arenas in Utah, according to the rodeo committee chairman.

A temporary fence will be constructed along the race track in front of the grand stand, outside the racing events which are scheduled for the afternoon of August 15th. Another temporary fence (Continued on page eight)

R. P. Nilsson, recently appointed superintendent of the Juab School District, is getting everything in readiness for the opening of the schools this fall.

"In attempting to direct the splendid educational system which you look upon with pride and upon which you depend for the proper guidance and education of your children, I feel humble and the need of your kind cooperation. The schools were organized and are maintained for the education of the children and a great deal of consideration school matters it should be with the welfare of the children in the foreground."
