In addressing the thousands of 2ct people who were on main street d during the contest of classes A and B. bands, Governor Eloc. 3ol cngratulated the people of rephi m fr their far-sightedness in publicd izing the community to the Intermountain country. He congraulat-ed the many bands that had been 10 performing that morning on Main ie street and stated that with the continuaion of band contests in the summer every community of the state would have an incentive to keep its band going for full 12 months of the year instead of disbanding at the close of school. Judges of the contests were Dr. E. M. Hiner of Los Angeles, Calif-ornia and Clarence J. Hawkins of the University of Utah at Salt Lake City. Both praised the incom-ment of mid summer band contests 0.0 and other entertainment.

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Three basaball games were held during the Stampede. In the feato ured opening game, the Industrial League won a 2-1 game from the Central Utah League; Helper took the first half championship from Dividend in the second game, and the third game was won by the Nephi team as they ran loose over the Sanpete-Sevier all stars 11 to 4. 30 horses from all over the Intermountain states competed in the racing Saturday.

The boxing matches Saturday evening featured a double-mainevent, with Leon Holman of Ft. Green losing to Max Fairbanks of Richfield and Max Young of Payson getting the nod over Red Bellee of Monroe in five rounds.

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The Prove high school band was awarded a \$150.00 French horn given by the King-Irvine Company of Salt Lake City for the outstanding band in the contests. Provo also won the class A prize.

The Nephi municipal band was awarded first prize money in the class B contests, and Moroni and Gunnison tied for the class O prize.

The Fairview Junior band was gven first ranking in the Frday contests, and the Fay and McRay Drum and Bugle Corps and he Richfield Girls drum and bugle d corps tied in their contest. 7

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
